Traditional Bullying Drops as Cyber Bullying Rises.

It's not only boys that get bullied. Girls get bullied too. In fact, statistics show that "Girls were much more likely than boys to be victims of both cyber bullying and traditional bullying." Girls who were victims of bullying in their early primary school years were more likely to remain victims as they get older, according to British research.
